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Sacramento Housing and Redevelopment Agency

The 150-unit 7th and H development was designed to help meet many important goals of the City of Sacramento, SHRA and developer Mercy Housing, including:

- Reducing homelessness through the provision of high quality, serviceenriched housing in fulfillment of Sacramento's 10 Year Plan to End Chronic Homelessness
- Building affordable, safe, attractive workforce housing in the downtown area
- Creating a connection between the existing downtown neighborhood and the future Railyards development.



EMPOWERING PEOPLE

Lack of affordable housing affects people from many walks of life, including seniors, children, working families, veterans, the disabled and the indigent. We're meeting the needs of thousands of families in a variety of ways, providing a safe, stable environment to live and grow.

PUBLIC HOUSING

SHRA is one of the largest landlords in Sacramento City and County with a portfolio of well-maintained public housing that includes a variety of housing types from apartments to duplexes, garden units and single family homes.

HOUSING CHOICE VOUCHER

Our partnership with private landlords serves low-income families through rent assistance vouchers, offering a wider choice in places to live in Sacramento City and County.

HOMES FOR VETERANS

We are proud to work with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs to help low income homeless veterans and their families find affordable housing through rental subsidy vouchers.

HOMEBUYER ASSISTANCE

We offer a variety of programs to help income qualified families buy a home and move onto the path toward generational wealth and a stable financial future.

HOPE FOR HOMELESS

Together with the City and County and service provider agencies, SHRA has implemented a multi-year strategy to serve homeless individuals and families using housing choice vouchers and public housing units.

STRENGTHENING NEIGHBORHOODS

We're carrying out several major federal initiatives and programs to help make targeted neighborhoods vibrant and sustainable.

COMMUNITY REVITALIZATION

We focus our community revitalization investment on projects such as streetscapes, lighting, infrastructure, parks, community centers and housing. This spurs investment from the private sector, resulting in new jobs and better housing opportunities in lower income neighborhoods.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

SHRA uses local and federal funds to construct and rehabilitate multifamily housing developments with resident services and professional property management allowing all residents to afford quality housing.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION

SHRA provides funding, expertise and public-private partnerships to preserve, restore and revitalize housing and historic structures, creating new opportunities for residents and the community.



TWIN RIVERS HOUSING PROJECT We're completely redeveloping Twin Rivers, one of our oldest public housing communities in the River District-Railyards neighborhood, to create a vibrant community that reconnects the residents and surrounding area through housing, services, employment and transportation.

DEL PASO NUEVO DEVELOPMENT The completed Del Paso Nuevo development in North Sacramento will feature 300 high quality affordable single family homes. The benefits of the DPN project extend beyond the boundaries of the development into the surrounding community, including infrastructure, parks, commercial development and job opportunities.



CHOICE NEIGHBORHOODS

SHRA is using over \$30 million in federal Choice Neighborhoods Planning and Implementation grants to transform and improve quality of life in our three largest public housing communities so that residents can live up to their full potential.

JOBS PLUS

SHRA is administering a \$2.5 million federal Jobs Plus grant to help residents aged 18–64 at our Marina Vista and Alder Grove public housing communities achieve economic stability by advancing employment outcomes through:

- Work readiness
- Educational advancement
- Employer networks
- Technology skills
- Job placement
- Financial literacy



OBS PLUS GRANT PROJECT

The Housing Authority partners with a variety of resource providers to help residents earn their high school diploma and receive job training/ certification and coaching in interview preparation. Local businesses are supporting the program by hiring residents from the community.

PROMISE ZONE



COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT

SHRA administers the federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) to fund projects that create economic opportunities that address the wholeness of communities so residents can live healthy, grow and thrive.

BLOCK GRANT PROJECT CDBG funds assisted the construction of the Louise Perez Resource Center which enabled Prime Time Nutrition Farm Fresh Foods to open a grocery store onsite to serve The Avenues community.
